Introduction

The 2022 administrative year saw the Association embarking on several initiatives geared towards accomplishing its stated objectives: these objectives as stated are,

- 1. Strategically seeking to expand the knowledge and advocacy skills of members of the Association.
- 2. Maintaining already existing relationships with international library organizations
- Actively engaging our members; seeking to provide new and innovative ways for training and development of staff in library institutions.

The Executive of the association was invited to meet with representatives from both the Barbican and the Calvary Baptist churches, in an effort to garner know-how in the establishment of a library to serve their respective communities. In hindsight, the initiative continues a historical trend and underscore the ethos that libraries were always an integral part of the church and community. Additionally, the president was invited to a meeting with the Jamaica Broadcasting Commission in which the creation of a digital media and Information literacy curriculum for the Jamaican education system was discussed. Regular Meetings



Records and Archives Management

The year 2022 saw the Records and Archives Management (RAM) Section with chair Tracey-Ann Ricketts. The year proved to be a mixed one for the section, filled with highs and lows.

The Strategic Plan for 2022 was developed, however, only a few of the initiatives presented came to fruition and the ones that did not was due mainly to time constraints of team members, the COVID-19 pandemic and personal issues. The outgoing Chair will support anyone who heads the Section in getting any proposals or initiatives that will be put forward.

Unfortunately, with the current COVID-19 crisis and time constraints the team only met twice via Zoom. The strategic plan for 2022 was completed at our first meeting and we discussed some plans to support practitioners in the RAM professions. Despite, not having official meetings, members in the section shared occasionally in the WhatsApp group.

For Records and Information Week 2022, the RAM Section hosted a bake sale which was a success and the section wants to publicly thank all the members who have supported the bake sale. The RAM Section was in the middle of planning a certified training session for RIM Professionals and Para-professionals which should have been held in August 2022; however, this had to be postponed due to circumstances beyond our control. The section is hoping that this workshop will be successful in 2023.

I must thank my colleagues who recently have volunteered to be a part of the RAM Section and I hope they will continue to serve and support the section throughout the Administrative Year.

For the upcoming year we are hoping to have a RAM Section/JARD Partnership and I would like to invite all members to actively participate and encourage the members of their

respective institutions to do so as well. Whole-hearted gratitude to LIAJA for affording me the opportunity to serve as Chair for the RAM Section, it was indeed a pleasure. The experience gained was instrumental; my involvement within the Association has enhanced my professional and personal development.

Retired Members

With the apparent lessening of the COVID pandemic, the Executive Committee held a face-to-face meeting on May 22 – having not met since February 2020 – to organize a programme for the year. High on the Agenda was to plan a regular meeting and this was held on July 15 in the Multifunctional Room at the UWI Library.

The response by members to the meeting was encouraging, but in the end only seven (7) persons were able to attend. At the meeting, members were brought up to date on developments since the last regular meeting – which was the AGM – in December 2019. Tributes were also paid to members who had died during the period. A second regular meeting – which like the first would have been face to face – was planned for October 22, but it was cancelled as the response by members was not encouraging. Not much enthusiasm was shown for an on-line meeting. In view of these responses, an AGM was not held.

In spite of the above, members kept in touch with each other by visits and by telephone and WhatsApp. We rejoiced with Mrs. Gloria Salmon, one of our founding members, on the launch of her autobiography, *Beyond My Wildest Dreams*, on November 2, but we regretted that she was unable to attend the event due to illness. Sadly, we lost two of our committed members during the year – Mrs Lashmi Mansingh on February 19th and Ms June Vernon on July 18th. We also note with regret the passing, at the end of October, of Ms Blossom Mullings, a former President of the Jamaica Library Association (1990). May the Souls of our retired colleagues Rest in Peace.

In 2023, the Group will have to decide on the way forward. One of the urgent things to be done is to recruit new members so we can regain the vibrancy we once enjoyed.

School Libraries

The section seems to have been the hardest hit by the pandemic and there have been significant fallouts. In addition, the mass migration of teachers has resulted in some of the teacher librarians leaving and some of those who opted to stay being assigned to classes. In addition, morale among school librarians is at an all-time low due to the challenging working conditions. So currently, it would be acceptable to say the school libraries sector in Jamaica is in a crisis.

An online workshop scheduled for post-library week was rescheduled. It was rescheduled for Thursday November 17, 2022, however, only eight persons turned up. Nonetheless, they were engaged for three hours in the preparation of action plans for their school libraries. Based on observation, this is an area that needs additional attention as the principals and vice-principals who vet these plans are not knowledgeable about what should be in the plans. A follow-up workshop will be held on March 9, 2023.

Special Libraries

The Chair, Ms Leleka Johnson would like to use this opportunity to say a huge thank you to the LIAJA Executive Committee for the support once again. The section did not have any activity for the year. One meeting was held within the section, with potential persons to sit on the committee, however this did not bear any fruit.

Special Libraries were able to participate and contribute to the LIAJA Library and Information Week held in November 2022; however the section did not have any activities during Special Libraries week in April 2022. The libraries within the section have resumed their regular activities, so we are looking forward to a better year for the 2023-2024 periods. Majority of the libraries within the section are funded by the government, so because of COVID and other circumstances funding has been minimal.

LIAJA continues to support the section in any way possible and continues to encourage other Special Library to come on board and join the association. As the Chair, I am appealing to all the Special Librarians in Jamaica to come on board and join the section, you all are needed in order for the section to prosper and grow to its full potential.

Reports of Working Parties

Education & Training

From the Executive Committee of the Library and Information Association of Jamaica, the Education and Training Working Party received the broad mandate to make plans to fulfill the following objectives:

- Determine the training needs of the information professionals
- Plan seminars/workshops
- Distribute critical information among colleagues
- Engage in practical collaborations with Working Parties/Sections
- Manage the mentorship programme via Library Training Institutions

The team comprising of Chair Nicola Palmer, Demar Cornwall and Sonia Stewart were only able to meet once on May 5, 2022.

Outcomes from the meeting:

- The need to revamp the mentorship program of LIAJA via the Library Training institution.
- Training sessions focusing on:
 - Use of collaborative tools in the workplace,
 - Accreditation Preparation for the Post Covid Institution,
 - Social Media Optimization.

The UCJ promised to organize a training session for Accreditation Preparation. As for the Social Media Optimization a consideration for a training session as been put in place. As it relates to the revamping of the mentorship programme contact was made with the president of Library & Information student society.

Fund Raising

Unfortunately the person elected to chair this working party was unable to continue in the post.

Information Technology

Mission/Objectives of the ITWP

The Information Technology working party plans, organizes, and suggests future information technology initiatives and activities, and formulates methods to better bring technology to the membership.

Roles & Functions

- Lead in the management and redesign of LIAJA 's webpage
- Facilitate IT training as required for members/executive

Strategic Priority

- To maintain a current LIAJA Website.
- To highlight various new and emerging technological tools which can be utilized or leveraged within the library and information sector.
- To promote lifelong learning, knowledge creation, and professional development.

Proposed Initiatives/Programmes for 2022

- 1. Update the LIAJA website. Areas of Focus: List of current Executive; Past Presidents, Photo Gallery, information on the Sections
- 2. Continue "Tech Tips"- An E-bulletin that will highlight<u>library technology</u>, general computer tutorials, technology news, software reviews, and personal computing tips. This will be published quarterly on the website: Apr.-Jun.; Jul.–Sept.; Oct.-Dec.
- 3. Create/Collate "Library Tech Weekly" feature for publishing on LIAJA social media pages (Facebook, Instagram). "Library Tech Weekly" highlights current technology trends in libraries and other information centres.

- 4. Create templates for Library and Information Week 2022, that can be uploaded to the website and circulated via the association's PRWP (Banner, Infographic, flyer, etc.)
- 5. Link LIAJA social media pages to the website.

Tasks Completed

- The 2022 IT Working Party of five (5) members had its retreat on March 11, 2022.
- 2. A WhatsApp group was thereafter created for the ITWP members
- Email addresses were created on April 29, 2022 for following LIAJA executives: Education and Training Working Party; Fundraising Working Party; and Functions Sub-section.
- 4. The LIAJA Executive members email signature, designed by the former PRWP chair was reviewed and passed on to the President for graphic design improvement.
- 5. Library Tech Weekly articles for June and July were submitted to the PR Working Party chair for posting on the LIAJA social media pages.
- 6. The following changes were made to the **LIAJA website**:
- a) The LIAJA Executive members list was updated on April 5, 2022.
- b) The updated list of Past Presidents and Secretaries was added to the website on the "About Us" page.
- c) The new email addresses for Executive members were also added to that page.
- d) The LIAJA constitution was removed from the website as requested on April 8, 2022 as it had errors needing correction.
- e) Pictures of our Library and Information Week church services, our first face to face events since the COVID-19 pandemic, were added to the photo gallery on the website (liaja.org.jm).
- f) Pictures from our last regular meeting in November were also added to the *Gallery* page.
- g) The Events & Promotions page was renamed News & Announcements.
- h) The notices of members who passed away recently (based on the information supplied by the PR WP) were added to the News & Announcements page.

- i) The QR code for the new membership forms, supplied by the membership WP, was added to the *Resources* page. The previous membership forms were removed.
- j) Headings for the various categories of information on the *Resources* page were added.
- k) An attempt was made to ensure that both the desktop view and the mobile view of the website were consistent and functional, but we realized that the feature "text overflow" was needed to ensure this. In reaching out to the website host, HB Jamaica, we found that such feature would incur an additional cost, so we opted to work around the feature.
 - 7. Members who paid their membership fees via the LIAJA website during the period were sent a "thank you" note as well as their invoice as proof of payment. Ten (10) membership fee payments were successfully received for 2022. Members with incomplete transactions were sent a follow-up note to encourage completion.
 - 8. There is currently an investigation on with HB Jamaica in regards to the removal of the security feature attached to membership fee payment via the LIAJA website. When paying fees via the website, members currently have to contact their bank and register their card before completing the transaction. Although this is a one-time task, most members paying through the website abandoned the process and leave the transaction incomplete.
 - 9. There is also investigation to find out whether or not the LIAJA social media pages can be linked to the LIAJA website without additional or significant cost.
 - 10. The Library and Information Week 2022 banner was done by the President's office that had the expertise instead of by the IT Working Party as was stated as one of the initiatives for the year.

The plans for the Membership and Conditions of Service Working Party (MCSWP) for 2022 were mainly focused on membership renewal, recruitment, member engagement and recognition. Due to the pandemic, there were not many opportunities for physical meetings and outreach activities, so the Working Party (WP) relied heavily on reaching members and potential members via digital means. Some of our activities are outlined below.

Membership Renewal and Recruitment

In order to increase the membership, member engagement, and to garner support for the working parties and sections, the first order of business for the MCSWP was an appeal sent out in April 2022 to members, past and present, as well as potential members, to join a working party or section. To bring about a better understanding of who we are and what we do, the Executive Job Descriptions were shared as well as the profile of each executive member.

To collect contact information, an electronic registration form was created and circulated among the membership, and to others. With the assistance of Mr. Mark-Jeffery Deans and Dr Ruth Baker Gardner, information was collected from students of UWI DLIS. Mrs. Keisha Walton was instrumental in collecting contact information from staff of the Jamaica Library Service. For people who provided contact information, they continued to receive announcements from the Association; however, not many of them signed up for membership or renewed. Hirfa Morrison of the Excelsior Community College, attempted to assist us with contact information from students in the DLIS LIS group, however, no response was received from EXED.

Several preliminary listings with the names of members were also circulated to members and nonmembers, along with the banking information for them to pay their fees as necessary. To facilitate the application process, the Chair, MCSWP, created an electronic application form and corresponding QR code which can be accessed from the LIAJA website. Publishing the preliminary listings proved very successful as quite a number of person applied for, or renewed their membership.

Member Recognition

A certificate of membership was created by Chair, MCSWP; a sample of which was shown at the Regular Meeting held in November. Starting in 2023, members will begin receiving their certificate of membership which will be valid for one year. These would be issued electronically but members can request hard copies for their files.

Congratulations were extended to Mr. John Aarons and his co-editors on their new publication "Archiving Caribbean Identity: Records, Community, and Memory. Congratulations were also extended to Dr. Sasekea Harris and team in publishing the LIAJA Journal number 3 (2022).

Birthday wishes were sent to retired members, Mrs. Norma Amenu-Kpodo and Dr. Hazel Bennett. A birthday greeting card was created for Kishma Simpson of the Jamaica Library Service and circulated.

Member Engagement

In observation of the 73rd anniversary of the LIAJA in the month of July 4 trivia questions were posted in which members were asked to guess the president based on clues given. Winners of the trivias were Lucianne Reid, Kadiesha Grant, Heather Thompson, and Tricia Pryce.

Feb 21 Passing of Mrs. Laxmi Mansingh

By now you must have heard the sad news of the passing of our colleague and friend Mrs Laxmi Mansingh on Saturday, February 19, 2022. We knew that she had not been well and was in hospital but that she was improving - that was not to be. With her passing the country, and indeed the region, has lost a committed, dedicated and hardworking librarian.

Laxmi was a faithful and active member of our Group and a very distinctive figure in her colourful saris. She was kind and generous and




hosted the Retired Member Group for several functions at her beautiful home. Actually, it was at her home in December 2019, that the group had its last gathering, as it was the venue of our AGM and Christmas Luncheon. Those of us who were there will remember how Laxmi, as a gracious hostess, made us feel so comfortable and at home. Laxmi studied at the Department of Library Studies, as it was then called, after she and her late husband Ajai and their young son, came to Jamaica in 1973 from India via Canada. The family fell in love with Jamaica and quickly made it their home and found their respective niches in various fields.

For Laxmi it was in the field of medical information and for years she was the Librarian in Charge of the Medical Library at UWI. She played a major role as coordinator of the Caribbean section of the Latin American and Caribbean Center on Health Sciences Information, (BIREME), known as MedCarib. She was involved in the establishment of the MedCarib database (database of bibliographic references of information on health sciences in the countries of the English-speaking Caribbean).

Laxmi was a hard worker and produced several articles and over 10 annotated bibliographies on various topics such as on AIDS, Accidents in Children, Fetus and Related Topics, and on Poisoning (which included a manual) and Hypertension. Had she still been working after 2020 she would have undoubtedly produced one on COVID! Any appreciation of the contribution of Laxmi to Jamaica and the region would be incomplete without mention of her beloved husband Ajai who died on 14 August 2011. Along with Ajai, a Professor in the Department of Zoology, they promoted the contribution of Indian culture to Jamaican life in many ways. In 1999 they produced the well-known work, Home Away from home: 150 years of Indian presence in Jamaica, 1845-1995 We extend our condolences to Laxmi's son Akshai, Dean of the Faculty of Sport at the UWI and a Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon and Sports Medicine Physician, her daughter-in-law Gunjan, a lecturer in the Department of Computing and her grandsons Abhijai and Atishai. 



Yesterday (July 18th), we were shocked and saddened to learn of the passing of Miss June Vernon who had suffered a massive stroke over the weekend and did not recover. June was a committed and dedicated librarian, who spent her entire career in the library field, working chiefly at the Jamaica Library Service, the Jamaica Information Service and the National Library of Jamaica. She was an active member of the Jamaica Library Association (as LIAJA was then called), serving in many positions on the Executive Committee including that of Secretary in 1990 and 1996, and President in 1991. She was more recently an active member of the Retired Members Group.

She joined the staff of the National Library of Jamaica shortly after its establishment in 1979 and worked there until she took early retirement in the late 1990's. She was Head of the Technical Services Department and later Deputy Director, Technical Services. Her forte was cataloguing in which she excelled – and loved – and she was also the editor of the Jamaica National Bibliography. She made an outstanding contribution to the development of the National Library especially in its formative years.

When she retired from the Library, she worked part time as a cataloguer in one or two special libraries. After a time, she stopped working and concentrated on her role as the chief caregiver to her beloved mother, Mrs Eulalee Vernon, who died in May 2018, a few days short of her 106th birthday.


June had a strong personality and as the saying goes, 'did not suffer fools gladly'. She was frank and spoke her mind, and you knew where you stood with her. At the same time, she was kind and generous. She demanded a high standard of work from the persons she supervised, and those who listened to her learned a great deal. There are several persons today, including many librarians, who speak highly of the influence she had on their lives. On a personal level, June was a friend as well as a colleague and we maintained contact over the years. I last spoke to her just over two weeks ago, on July 1, to tell her that Elsie and I were leaving the island that afternoon for a holiday, and that if she tried to call me at home on my birthday in early August, she would not reach me. (She did not concern herself with Facebook or What'sApp). She wished me birthday greetings in advance and said that

the chocolate birthday cake, which she had long promised, would soon become a reality! Alas, this was not to be.

She will be missed, but we give thanks for her life and work and offer our condolences to Leisa, her daughter, a librarian herself, who works at the Norman Manley Law School, to her sister Jacqueline Bertram, her brother Herman, nieces, nephews and other family members.

Reports of Sub-Committees

Advocacy

Submitted by: Adele Merritt Bernard, Advocacy Sub-Committee

The Advocacy Sub-Committee hoped to capitalize on the previous year's foundation for building a sustainable advocacy platform for LIAJA, as well as offering training to empower members to advocate for themselves in their respective work environments.

To this end, negotiations were undertaken with Blazing Beyond to conduct two (2) five-hour, workshop-based training exercises for LIAJA members as part of Library Week celebrations in November. The sessions were aimed at improving Personal Leadership and Accountability skills to drive overall organizational performance and would have consisted of one face-to face session and one virtual session to facilitate participation from members across the island. Feedback however indicated that the price point of JA\$10,000.00 was prohibitive resulting in the cancellation of the proposed workshops, as the Association was not in a financial position to subsidize the event. Two other workshops "Innovation begins with I" and a session focussed on Strategic Planning met a similar fate, as all facilitators quoted a similar price point for sessions.

From September 26th – 28th, 2022 the Chair attended an online Library Advocacy and Funding Conference. The Conference was divided into nine main tracks, namely book banning, fundraising, library management and leadership, media messaging and communication, understanding library fundraising, advocacy, understanding and using big data, marketing your library and library campaigns and elections. Although skewed to the North American environment, there were useful insights which could be adapted for use in Jamaica.

The Sub-Committee did not participate in any international advocacy activities, as we were unable to continue our relationship with the International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA) in coordination with Mr. Stephen Wyber, Manager, Policy and Advocacy due to a lapse in our membership. We were therefore not kept abreast of, or consulted on, local, regional or international advocacy activities.

For the year under review, the Sub-Committee was again essentially operating as a party of one and it was therefore difficult to adequately address all areas of our mandate as desired. I am nevertheless thankful to Ms. Sandra Stubbs of The University of the West Indies, Western Jamaica Campus, who did offer support when possible. I end by encouraging all members to become more active in the Association, our Association, as "Unity is strength…when there is teamwork and collaboration wonderful things can be achieved" Mattie J. T. Stepanek (July 17, 1990 – June 22, 2004).







JAMAICA LIBRARY SERVICE ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE LIBRARY AND INFORMATION ASSOCIATION OF JAMAICA February 2022 – January 2023

As an agency of the Ministry of Education and Youth, the Jamaica Library Service (JLS) continued to support the recovery of learning loss experienced in the education sector for over two years, as a result of the disruptions from the COVID-19 pandemic. As the nation celebrated 60 years of independence under the theme *Re-igniting a Nation for Greatness* the organization joined in the celebration by coordinating a range of value added programmes and events throughout 2022.

Several achievements resulted, enabled by the strengthening of long-standing partnerships and the forging of new engagements. Highlights included:

- Partnership with EduFocal Limited to establish online learning centres in public libraries islandwide, inclusive of the proposed renovation of the Joyce Robinson Hall, Kingston & St. Andrew Parish Library and working with the JLS to transform libraries across Jamaica
- Partnership with Ntukuma, the Storytelling Foundation of Jamaica to produce the hybrid staging (face-to-face and online) of the annual Ananse Soundsplash Storytelling Conference and Festival
- Carlong Publishers' donation of 1,000 copies of its publications to the JLS for distribution to public and school libraries islandwide as effort in part to combat the learning loss experienced since the pandemic
- A face-to-face Awards Ceremony to mark the culmination of the 2021/2022 season of the National Reading Competition.
- Enagements and initiatives in observance of Jamaica 60, Read Across Jamaica Day and Library & Information Week
- Launch of the book, Beyond My Wildest Dreams by Gloria Salmon, former Director General
- Professional Development Workshops and Seminars for librarians and Teacher-Librarians
- Establishment of a Jamaica Library Service Research and Publications Committee mandated to stimulate and advance research and publication about the organization

• Seventeen (17) members of staff receiving long service awards from the Jamaica Civil Service for 25 years or more of service and four (4) members of staff being recipients of the Badge of Honour for Gallantry at the National Honours & Awards Ceremony.

PARTNERSHIPS Technology in Education Partnership Agreement with EduFocal Limited

The Jamaica Library Service and EduFocal Limited signed a partnership agreement on August 12, 2022 for the establishment of digital learning centres in parish libraries. The partnership also entails the EduFocal investment in infrastructure development of select libraries island wide; provision of free internet access, training of JLS staff, earmarked spaces for students to attend virtual classes through the EduFocal Academy platform and other supplementary programmes to new library members.

Youth Development & Career Advancement -

JLS partnered with the Ministry of The Education and Youth, Heart NSTA Trust and Junior Achievement Jamaica in observance of National Career Week from February 5 to 11, 2022 under the theme "Career Success: Building Critical Skills to Navigate the Future." As part of the partnership, the JLS hosted a Career Forum in the Jovce Robinson Hall at the Kingston and St. Andrew Parish Library on February 7, 2022. The forum was shared via Zoom to the parish library networks and streamed live on JLS's social media platforms with an overall viewership in excess of 550 persons. All parish libraries mounted displays utilizing resources provided through HEART and hosted students throughout the week to engage in career talks and other activities.

The JLS, through its public and school library network, organized face-to-face and online readings in observance of Read Across Jamaica Day on May 3, 2022. A highlight of the observance was the visit of the Minister of Education, the Hon. Fayal Williams to the Kingston and St. Andrew Parish Library, to participate in a reading session with students from various schools at the primary level. The Minister read from the title "Little Lion Goes for Gold" by Kellie Magnus and engaged students with questions throughout the session. Students were also encouraged to become active library members and read for enjoyment, while developing comprehension and critical thinking skills. A total of 78 other sessions were held island wide with 41 schools impacting 3,738 students and 13 major sessions in public libraries impacting over 1,500 patrons.

A new programme was also launched for the month, dubbed School Library Virtual "Link-up". The objective of the initiative was to highlight the importance of school libraries to the teaching and learning process. The "Link-up" used the virtual space to have school libraries 'visit' other school libraries and for students and to teacher-librarians to interact; view the resources offered and be exposed to best practices.


Book Launch - Beyond My Wildest Dreams



INTRODUCTION

This report highlights the activities of the National Library of Jamaica for the period January 3 - December 31, 2022.

INTERNAL OPERATIONS

JAMLIN Manager and LIAJA Representative - Ms. Chantelle Richardson was the Acting Manager Jamaica Libraries and Information Network (JAMLIN) and LIAJA representative for NLJ from September 2021 to August 2022. Mrs. Desaray Pivott-Nolan subsequently took on the role of LIAJA representative for NLJ in November 2022 upon the resignation of Ms. Chantelle Richardson.

NLJ Health Fair - This was held on May 26, 2022. Complementary and paid services were offered to NLJ team members by Sagicor representatives.

Acquisition of the FlexScan800 Scanner- This equipment was received by the NLJ on May 26, 2022. Its capabilities include scanning microfilm, microfiche and aperture cards at 3:40 minutes per 16mm/95 ft. roll. 


